

Dear Visual Art Students,

Congratulations! The faculty and staff are delighted to have you participate in **Session Two** of the GSA Visual Art program. This packet is designed to give you a sense of what GSA will be like and what you need to do in preparation for the program. Time moves fast, so please read the following carefully. July 10th, 2022 will be upon us very soon!

During GSA, you will be working in three different studio areas:

- 1. Drawing & Painting (instructor Nathaniel Hendrickson)
- 2. <u>Printmaking (instructor Hannah Smith)</u>
- 3. Ceramics & Sculpture (instructors Azucena Trejo Williams & Sean M. Starowitz)

The Visual Art program includes studio projects, guest artists, and field trips during the first two weeks, with more independent work, documentation, and exhibition preparation during the third week. In addition to creating works of art, we ask that you contribute verbally to critiques and that you keep a minimum of two sketchbooks (a new one any size you like, and an old one full of sketches and ideas). It is important that you come to GSA with lots of ideas and imagery you are ready to develop further.

What To Do Before GSA

- Spend some time at a local art museum, library, or bookstore. Then, use the Internet to gather information on some artists, techniques, ideas, or artwork that speaks to you. Please bring these sources of information with you to develop your ideas and share with your classmates. We will be asking you about these during the program.
- Please choose <u>two</u> artists from the <u>Master Artist List</u> below (as well as <u>three</u> more artists—one from each additional list provided for our three studio areas throughout this document). If you're having a hard time choosing, ask yourself this: "Which five artists speak the most to me?" Print out some samples of their work and attach them to your <u>new</u> sketchbook. Then, create some sketches and contour line drawings in the manner of the <u>five</u> artists chosen. Be prepared to discuss why you chose their work and what exactly interests you about his or her work. Please note that you might be asked to use these drawings and work samples to create art at GSA.

VISUAL ART SUPPLY LIST

Art Wear & Cleanup

- Old **t-shirt**, **smock** <u>and/or</u> cloth **apron**
- Closed-toe shoes
- Sunhat and sunglasses
- Four old t-shirts (to print on and to use as rags for cleanup in painting and printmaking)
- Unwanted clothing item for paper pulp
- **Towel** (to sit on outside)
- Bottle of hand lotion
- <u>Two pairs</u> of *reusable* rubber <u>or</u> latex gloves (for printmaking)

Art Tools

- **Hard-copy photos** (including a side view/profile photo of yourself) for image references. <u>You will not have access</u> to your phone or internet while in the studios nor the ability to photocopy
- **Empty portfolio** 24"x36" (homemade or purchased)
- 22" or 30" Masonite or lightweight wooden drawing board, labeled with your name
- Roll of **blue painter's tape**
- Large clips (bulldog clips) for holding paper on your drawing board
- Exacto knife (#11 or other) and/or utility knife
- 18" metal ruler with cork back
- Pair of sharp scissors
- Fish tackle or art box (with handle) for carrying and storing your supplies

Art Materials & Mark Making Supplies

- Two sketch books (one new, one old)
 - **New sketchbook (size of your choice)** is what you'll always have to take notes and sketch. *And, as a reminder—this is also what you're using to research your five artists.*
 - **Old sketchbook** is already full of great ideas, sketches, and/or prints of your own photographic images.
- Your favorite mark-making materials, such as a set of watercolors, Crayola markers (bold or original), pastels and/or oil pastels and/or colored pencils <u>and</u> assorted drawing pencils (2b, 6b or whatever you like to use!)
- One glue stick
- Other personal favorite art supplies/ brushes that you may want to use when working independently. (We will provide all of the necessary supplies for you for formal projects!)
- Kneaded and/or plastic eraser
- **Sharpies** thick and thin-lined for drawing
- A fine detail paintbrush
- Workable fixative spray used on charcoals and pastel drawings
- Collage materials for printmaking
- Ballpoint pen for printmaking
- Empty containers (yogurt, pasta sauce, etc.) for saving ink
 - Please <u>do not</u> bring containers that previously held anything related to drugs, alcohol or tobacco. These items will not be allowed at GSA (even if empty).

Art Inspiration

- A few objects that could be used to create a still life and inspire you for drawings. Try to bring some that are transparent and some that are opaque.
 - For example, something made from glass or plastic (transparent) versus a dark, solid object (opaque). In other words: a variety of small objects, in man-made and natural forms, that absorb light and reflect light and have interesting textures and shapes.
- Original color and black/white photographs, as well as original drawings you've made.
- Sketches and drawings created in the manner of the 5 specific artists you've chosen from the lists provided.
 - We'd also like you to bring a few hard-copy printouts of their work.
 - **REMINDERS**
 - Print out samples of the 5 artists' work and create sketches and contour line drawings in your new sketchbook. Do this in the manner of the artists themselves.
 - Be prepared to discuss why you chose their work and what exactly interests you about it.

Miscellaneous Supplies

- Face Masks/Coverings We ask that you bring enough face masks for 3 weeks at GSA.
- **Spending Money** Though housing, meals, room, and board are covered by GSA, you might want a little extra money for GSA merch on-campus or souvenirs during field trips.

PRINTMAKING PREPARATION

Instructor – Hannah Smith

At GSA, you will be introduced to a range of printmaking processes, like traditional carving and lithography techniques, processes assisted by modern technology, and those which blur the boundaries between sculpture, printmaking, and painting. Students will leave GSA with an understanding of the expanded field of printmaking and its applications in contemporary artistic practices.

How To Prepare For Your Projects (Before GSA) – It is important that you come with images and ideas that you can easily transfer and copy onto the film "positives" and "negatives" we will be creating. I recommend you bring photocopies (Xerox) of high-contrast drawings, photographs, magazines, comic books, etc. that you would like to play with.
Preferably, the images should have definite lights and bold dark tones. Images should not be larger than 8.5" X 11". Think about how different images might work together if layered on top of each other. It's good to note that gray (flat) images do not translate very well. Collage will likely be part of our design process; I recommend visiting *Half Price Books* and/or *thrift stores* for inexpensive book/magazine collage material. You will also need to bring at least one article of unwanted clothing to be recycled for colorful paper pulp. For our screen-printing project, you will need to collect a few (at least 5) containers and a ballpoint pen.

Materials We'll Use

- Empty containers (yogurt, pasta sauce, etc.)
 - Please <u>do not</u> bring containers that previously held anything related to drugs, alcohol or tobacco. These items will not be allowed at GSA (even if empty).
- At least one article of unwanted clothing (you can bring more than one, if you like)
- One ballpoint pen
- Photocopies of high-contrast drawings, photos, etc.
- **Collage materials** (magazines, comic books, etc.)

CERAMICS & SCULPTURE PREPARATION

Instructors – Azucena Trejo Williams & Sean M. Starowitz

At GSA, you will get introduced to a range of **spatial thinking** and **sculptural/3D techniques**. By working with ceramics and not-so-traditional materials, we will explore how different methods of making will expand your artistic practice. We will work through a variety of projects that will challenge scale, material, and conceptual making. During the program, we

strongly encourage interdisciplinary thinking and collaboration between visual art GSA's eight other artforms.

"DISCREET OBJECT" Project Prep – Please bring at least 5 items of importance, <u>preferably no larger than the size of</u> <u>your hand</u>. We want these objects to mean something to you. Be open and think about its presence, shape, and form. One of these objects should artistically describe you. *Is it something you carry in your pocket, maybe for good luck? A small river stone from a hike that sits on your bookshelf? Your grandma's thimble?*

DRAWING & PAINTING PREPARATION Instructor – Nathaniel Hendrickson

In the Drawing and Painting Studio, we will work from a variety of sources, including **direct observation**, **imagination**, and **print material**.

PROJECT #1 – CHARACTER SELF PORTRAIT

CONCEPT– Inspired by **Paula Rego** and **Jordan Casteel**, students will combine figure painting with visual elements that personify their character (real or imagined).

How To Prepare For This Project (Before GSA) – Please bring in items of personal significance that inspire you. If you are unable to bring these items to GSA (for inconvenience reasons), detailed photos of these items are permitted/encouraged.

• **Examples** – Family photos, photocopies of library resources, magazines, images of favorite paintings, jewelry, glasses, iconography, photos of favorite animals, house plants, special mementos, etc.

PROJECT #2 – INDEPENDENT STUDY

CONCEPT– Plan and execute a project that you've always wanted to try that deals with **something unavoidable in contemporary society or recent history** (think from the microcosmic to the macrocosmic scale). Using your preferred medium of choice (and another medium that you would like to learn/master), create a mixed media piece that incorporates direct observation, imagination, and photographic sources. Consider **collage** or **décollage** as a possible technique. (Optional: Imagine how some aspect of your project could result in a simple collaboration with another discipline (poetry, dance, music, etc.)).

How To Prepare For This Project (Before GSA) – Visit <u>moma.org</u> and <u>metmuseum.org</u> and browse their vast art collection! Choose at least 5 artists whose work that you find interest in and write them down in your sketchbook. Do a little research on their background and their art. This will help inspire you while you work in the studio at GSA! We will not

only work on numerous projects, but we will also discuss artists both historical and contemporary as part of your visual arts practice.
