

Dear Creative Writing Students,

Congratulations—You're coming to GSA this summer!

We couldn't be more excited for you about this point in your life. GSA is an important time. It's a chance to grow as a writer, to learn more about your craft, to explore other artforms, and to meet fellow creatives who share your interests. In short, GSA is an experience. These will be three transformative weeks for you.

What to Expect

We will work on all aspects of writing, from idea creation and drafting, to revising and polishing, and publishing and performance. Together, we'll refine our strengths and tackle our obstacles, while pushing each other to experiment with new subjects and forms (like adding music and rhythm to your piece). We'll achieve this in the form of lectures, small group workshops, individual conferences, daily writing exercises, manuscript critique sessions, and in visits from real working writers.

You will also have the opportunity participate in interdisciplinary activities (engaging in artforms other than your own). In addition, you will produce a body of work and assemble a chapbook. You'll even be learning about writing for the stage and how to present your work to audiences in public readings.

What We Expect from You

The two most important things we expect from you are **curiosity** and **optimism**. We expect you to be interested in working on your writing and in learning as much as you can. We expect you to be willing to revise, to try new things, and to consider comments from other writers. We expect you to listen attentively to the many voices of your classmates, faculty, staff, and our guest artists. Above all, we expect that you believe in yourself, for you can solve all your creative obstacles. Even if you struggle to do that on your own, *we promise to help you*.

Of course, we also expect you to be on time and to be ready to start work immediately. Our classes are fast-paced and intense, and there's a lot we want you to learn! We expect you to take care of yourself before and during the program, so you'll be able to keep up with the workload and get as much out of the GSA experience as possible. This means eating well and making sure you get enough rest. (We know it can be tempting, but please don't have too much ice cream!)

We also expect you to give each other the utmost respect. In other words, treat each other with the care and sensitivity you'd want for yourself.

What to Bring to the Writing Program

- Please bring a **laptop computer**. While iPads and tablets may work, we've had technical problems with them in the past. We'll be collaborating on your devices and sharing digital files to limit our use of paper.
